Dunn County has a variety of recreational resources ranging from hunting and fishing to golfing and picnicking. The County is characterized by rolling hills and numerous fishing streams. The Red Cedar River is known for its many fishing, canoeing, and camping opportunities. Trout fishing is also popular in Dunn County with the DNR continually stocking many of its streams, including Big Elk, Wilson, Muddy, Knight, and Gilbert Creeks. A groomed and well-marked snowmobile route runs the length of the County. Hoffman Hills Park has recently been developed into a cross-country ski area. Of state significance is the Red Cedar Trail which runs parallel to the Red Cedar River from Menomonie to the Dunnville Wildlife Area.

Miscellaneous

HIGHWAYS—Dunn County is served by a network of Interstate, U.S. and State Highways. Interstate 94 runs east and west through the County. USH 12 and STH 64, 170, 29, 85 and 72 also run east and west. STH 40, 25, and 79 provide for north-south travel. Many other county and local roads connect with these highways to link the cities, villages, and recreational areas in the County.

RAIL SERVICE—Dunn County is served by two railroads -- Canadian National (CN) and the Union Pacific (UP). The CN serves the Dunn County communities of Boyceville, Colfax, and Wheeler from the east. The UP connects West Central Wisconsin with Minneapolis-St. Paul and Chicago. This rail line serves the Dunn County communities of Elk Mound, Knapp, and Menomonie.

AIR SERVICE—Dunn County has two publicly-owned airports. A medium general aviation airport with a 5,000 foot runway and a 3,400 foot runway is located in Menomonie and a small general aviation airport with a 3,300 foot runway is located near Boyceville. Dunn County also has access to air commercial service airports in both Eau Claire and Minneapolis-St. Paul.

BUS SERVICE—Greyhound and Jefferson Lines provide intercity bus service between the Twin Cities and Madison and Milwaukee, and Twin Cities and Green Bay, respectively. Buses stop at the UW-Stout student center in Menomonie. The Dunn County Transit Commission provides fixed route services within Menomonie, as well as some rural transit services.

EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES—The Chippewa Valley Technical College, located in the Cities of Eau Claire, Chippewa Falls, and Menomonie, serves the technical training needs of Dunn County. Associate degree and vocational education programs are offered in the areas of agriculture, services, allied health, nursing, business, marketing, trade and industry, general education, as well as apprenticeship trades. Three nearby University of Wisconsin campuses provide excellent educational services. UW-Stout, located in Menomonie, is nationally known for its programs in industry, technology, and art and design.
